This study uses the Uganda Demographic and Health Survey, 2011.

The study seeks to answer the question of impact of each (male and female) households head with different demographic, economic, social, environmental characteristics on children welfare.

This study depends on Logistic Regression mathematical modelling to assess the relationship among variables.
